Notification Systems and Important Information Centers

SoCoAlert – By signing up for SoCoAlert, you can select to receive alerts through landline calls, cell phone, text messages or pre-recorded verbal messages and email. The system also works with telephone devices for the deaf. You can sign up online at https://public.coderedweb.com/CNE/en-US/BF7053564662. For general questions about SoCo Alert, call (707) 565-1369.

Nixle – You can receive email and text messages from local fire and law enforcement agencies that include public safety messages as well as emergency information. Text your zip code to 888777 to opt-in or sign up online at https://local.nixle.com to receive email, text or voice messages with alerts and advisories.

2-1-1 is an information and referral service for Sonoma County. It connects Sonoma County callers, website-users and texters with information about health and human services available to them. During times of disaster, 2-1-1 provides incident-specific information in coordination with local emergency services, including road closures and shelters..

PulsePoint Respond App is a 911-connected app that can immediately inform you of emergencies occurring in your community and can request your help when CPR is needed nearby

National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration (NOAA) Weather Radio – The National Weather Service can remotely turn on these radios and send basic alerts, including for wildfire. The message may be accompanied by a warning tone, depending on the model of radio you purchase (approx \$30). Sonoma County residents may tune their NOAA radio to frequency 162.475. If you are deaf or have hearing loss these radios have add-on equipment such as strobe lights and bed shakers.

When fire weather is severe (Red Flag Warning), a fire is burning nearby, or an evacuation is anticipated, follow this checklist (if time allows) to give you and your home the best chance of surviving a wildfire. Read through it BEFORE a fire, to better understand your priorities and decision-making process when a fire strikes.
